SUBJECT: Master Plan Survey Results Summary

DATE: June 30, 2025

Public input was sought throughout the process through a survey to solicit public desires and concerns regarding the Master Plan update. The survey was available on the internet via Survey Monkey starting in mid-March. A total of 451 surveys were completed. Comments from the survey are described below:


GENERAL

The survey found that 81% of respondents are residents of the City. 74% shop or dine in the City, 62% are property owners, and 45% attend an institution in the City. A majority of respondents have lived in the City for over 21 years. A large portion of participants are between the ages of 35 and 64.

LIKES, CHANGES, AND IMPROVEMENTS


The first set of questions were in regards to what residents like about the City as well as what they would like to see change or improve.

- In general, what do you like about Coopersville? (Select all that apply)






- What do you like the most about Downtown Coopersville? (Select all that apply)




- In general, what do you think needs to change from its current condition in Coopersville? (Select all that apply)






- What needs upgrading or improvement in your neighborhood? (Select all that apply)

HOUSING

The next section of the survey asked questions about housing. Participants were asked if the housing options meet their needs. 68% of respondents said yes, 20% said no, the cost is too high. 24% of participants said they were in support of the City exploring options to expand the current housing stock. 43% were not in support of the City expanding housing stock and 21% were neutral.

Regarding where new housing should be developed, 44% said it should be on the outskirts, 44% said it should be on vacant lots throughout the City, 31% does not support the development of new housing, 21% said housing should be downtown, near recreational and commercial destinations.

Next, participants were asked to rate the following housing option from 1 to 5 (1 being the least desired, 5 being the most desired).

TRANSPORTATION

Following housing, participants were asked about the City's transportation needs and efforts. The following are their general responses.

98% of residents use passenger vehicles to travel within Coopersville, 62% walk, and 32% bike through the City. Generally, residents tend to feel safe biking and walking in the downtown area: 41% saying they feel safe and 34% saying they feel very safe. On the topic of public transportation, the majority of residents say it is either not important (57%) or they are neutral/no opinion (30%). Participants were pretty evenly split regarding the placement of sidewalks. 47% would like them to be installed wherever one currently exists and 53% believe they should be installed in key locations, such as near downtown.

PARKS AND RECREATION

The last set of questions were pertaining to parks and recreational desires. 82% of respondents feel they have safe and convenient access to the parks downtown. 53% were satisfied with the City's current parks system. When asked if they were satisfied with the City's current trail system, 49% had no opinion on the trail system followed by 30% being satisfied.

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS

The final portion of the survey was left for participants to leave more general ideas and concerns. The following are their comments:

1. Rising cost of property taxes and the city wanting more of our hard earned money that's taxed 10x over we pay taxes on everything when it was supposed to be a temporary 3% when 1st introduced and now we are paying 37% & more & you want more, you have people struggling to put food on the table & pay bills but you want more how about addressing the greediness & theft you are imposing on the people who make up this community & pay your wages
2. We need more affordable housing for new families. It is very hard for young families to move here. People want to live here, let's help make that happen!
3. Leave the water meters alone!
4. I believe if more low-income apartments are approved crime will go up.
5. Our Current City Manager and Assistant City Manager should not be brokering or bargaining on behalf of the City for Tax Breaks, Zoning Changes for specific Landowners and Developers nor should they



personally be allowed to help and encourage developers to seek changes to property unless those options are available on every level, zoning designation or property owner . The recent Changes made to our Zoning Ordinances specifically targeting our PUD areas I feel are unethical and discriminatory

6. The city's current road structure and traffic patterns cannot handle more people living in town.
7. Stop canceling meetings and approving things without the citizens' agreement or voting on the matter. For this reason, I am trying to learn more about these city politics
8. No more apartments!!
9. Add a few lights to the areas that are too dark when walking

14. I feel criminal activity is increasing, however, that could be due to overpopulation of the city.
15. The Grove street bridge. Truck traffic through town (down Randall between the exits) is getting out of hand. Trucks frequently speed. Would love to see the grocery store be held to higher standards. The parking lot is inaccessible in the winter time (are they not required to shovel/plow? Homeowners are). We don't need more dollar generals, fast food places, etc. Preference should be given to family owned/small town stores in the form of tax incentives for smaller businesses and tax hikes for bigger businesses. Example: Coops Hardware vs TSC/Ace/Tru Value.
16. City officials are not representative of its citizens. Too many businesses have taken away from the small-town charm that attracted us to Coopersville in the first place.
17. Quit being greedy. You say affordable housing no one can afford the prices you are putting on things

Some cities offer serves to the elderly for repairs as upkeep is hard and when the home is sold there would be a recapture in effect.
